Directors' report

The directors of InvestSMART Funds Management Ltd, the Responsible Entity of Intelligent Investor Ethical Share Fund (the "Fund"), present their report together with the financial statements of the Fund for the year ended 30 June 2025.

Principal activities

The Fund is an Australian registered managed investment scheme which was constituted on 18 December 2018, registered on 18 December 2018, commenced operations on 07 June 2019 and its units commenced trading on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX: INES) on 12 June 2019 subject to its obligations under Aqua Rules and ASX Operating Rules. The Fund is domiciled in Australia.

The Fund invests in a portfolio of between 10 and 35 Australian and international holdings with market prices at material discounts to their estimated value in accordance with the Product Disclosure Statement ("PDS") and the Fund's Constitution.

The Fund did not have any employees during the year.

There were no significant changes in the nature of the Fund's activities during the year.

Significant changes in state of affairs

The PDS for the Fund was amended on 1 July 2024. The amended PDS now includes the Funds ability to invest in international holdings. The PDS was further amended in April 2025 to increase the international holdings in the Fund. The Fund will now be able to hold up to 40% of its total securities in international holdings. The first international holdings were purchased in July 2024.

Likely developments and expected results of operations

The Fund will continue to be managed in accordance with the investment objectives and guidelines as set out in the Product Disclosure Statement and the provisions of the Fund's Constitution.

The results of the Fund's operations will be affected by a number of factors, including the performance of investment markets in which the Fund invests. Investment performance is not guaranteed and future returns may differ from past returns. As investment conditions change over time, past returns should not be used to predict future returns.

No insurance premiums are paid for out of the assets of the Fund in regards to insurance cover provided to the officers of InvestSMART Funds Management Ltd. As long as the officers of InvestSMART Funds Management Ltd act in accordance with the Fund's Constitution and the Law, the officers remain indemnified out of the assets of the Fund against losses incurred while acting on behalf of the Fund.

1 General information

These financial statements cover Intelligent Investor Ethical Share Fund (the "Fund") as an individual entity. The Fund is an Australian registered managed investment scheme which was constituted on 18 December 2018, registered on 18 December 2018 and its units commenced trading on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX: INES) on 12 June 2019. The Fund is domiciled in Australia.

The Responsible Entity of the Fund is InvestSMART Funds Management Ltd (ABN 62 067 751 759) (AFSL 246441) (the "Responsible Entity"). The Responsible Entity's registered office is Suite 2, Level 2, 66 Clarence Street, Sydney, NSW 2000. These financial statements are presented in Australian dollars.

The Fund aims to invest in a portfolio of Australian listed companies in accordance with the Product Disclosure Statement and the provisions of the Fund's Constitution.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the directors on the date the Directors' declaration was signed. The directors of the Responsible Entity have the power to amend and reissue the financial statements.

2 Summary of material accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to the year presented, unless otherwise stated in the following text.

(a) Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the *Corporations Act 2001* in Australia.

The Fund is a for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of fair value measurement of assets and liabilities, except where otherwise stated.

The statement of financial position is presented on a liquidity basis. Assets and liabilities are presented in decreasing order of liquidity and do not distinguish between current and non-current. All balances are expected to be recovered or settled within 12 months, except for investments in financial assets.

The Fund manages financial assets at fair value through profit or loss based on the economic circumstances at any given point in time, as well as to meet any liquidity requirements. As such, it is expected that a portion of the portfolio will be realised within 12 months, however, an estimate of that amount cannot be reliably determined as at reporting date.

In the case of net assets attributable to unit holders, the units are redeemable on demand at the unit holder's option. However, holders of these instruments typically retain them for the medium to long term. As such, the amount expected to be settled within 12 months cannot be reliably determined.

(i) Compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS)

The financial statements of the Fund also comply with IFRS as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB).

(ii) Adoption of New and Revised Accounting standards

The Fund has adopted all of the new and revised standards and interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board that are relevant to its operations and effective for the current reporting period. The adoption of new and revised standards and interpretations has not had a material impact on the Fund. Any other new, revised or amending Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted. The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the financial performance or position of the Fund.

(b) Changes in accounting estimate

During the year ended 30 June 2025, the Fund changed its valuation input for listed financial assets and liabilities from using quoted bid prices to using quoted last traded prices (both considered Level 1 inputs under AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement). The change was made to align the Fund's financial reporting valuation approach with that used for unit pricing. The changed valuation input for the listed financial assets and liabilities in the Fund reflects a change of \$55,495.

Management considers the last traded price to better reflect fair value in an active market. The change is considered a change in accounting estimate in accordance with AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and has been applied prospectively from 1 July 2024.

This change has no impact on the valuation of investments for unit pricing purposes. Comparative figures have not been restated.

(c) Financial instruments

(i) Classification

The Fund's investments are classified at fair value through profit or loss. They comprise:

- Investments in listed equities, listed unit trusts and interest bearing securities.
- Derivative financial instruments such as forward currency contracts. The Fund designates forward currency contracts used to hedge currency risk of offshore listed securities as hedges in a hedging relationship.

The Fund classifies its investments based on its business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The Fund's portfolio of financial assets is managed and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis in accordance with the Fund's documented investment strategy. The Fund's policy is for the Responsible Entity to evaluate the information about these financial assets on a fair value basis together with other related financial information.

2 Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

(c) Financial instruments (continued)

(i) Classification (continued)

For equity securities and derivatives, the contractual cash flows of these instruments do not represent solely payments of principal and interest. Consequently, these investments are measured mandatorily at fair value through profit or loss.

(ii) Recognition/derecognition

The Fund recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes party to the contractual agreement (trade date) and recognises changes in fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities from this date.

Investments are derecognised when the right to receive cash flows from the investments has expired or the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

(iii) Measurement

- Financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss

At initial recognition, the Fund measures a financial asset at its fair value. Custody transaction costs associated with the financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in the statement of comprehensive income.

Subsequent to initial recognition, all financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value. Gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of the 'financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' category are presented in the statement of comprehensive income within net gains/(losses) on financial instruments held at fair value through profit or loss in the period in which they arise. The fair value of financial assets and liabilities traded in active markets is subsequently based on their quoted market prices at the end of the reporting period without any deduction for estimated future selling costs. The quoted market price used for financial assets and liabilities is the last traded price for financial assets and the financial liabilities.

(iv) Derivatives

The Fund designates hedging instruments, which include derivatives in respect of foreign currency risk, as fair value hedges. At the inception of the hedge relationship, the Fund documents the relationship between the hedging instrument and the hedged item, along with its risk management objectives and its strategy for undertaking various hedge transactions. Furthermore, at the inception of the hedge and on an ongoing basis, the Fund documents whether the hedging instrument is highly effective in offsetting changes in fair values of the hedged item attributable to the hedged risk.

(v) Fair value hedges

Changes in the fair value of derivatives that are designated and qualify as fair value hedges are recognised in Statements of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income immediately, together with any changes in the fair value of the hedged asset or liability that are attributable to the hedged risk. The change in the fair value of the hedging instrument and the change in the hedged item attributable to the hedged risk are recognised in Statements of Profit or Loss in the line item relating to the hedged item. Hedge accounting is discontinued when the hedging instrument expires or is sold, terminated, or exercised, or when it no longer qualifies for hedge accounting.

(v) Impairment

At each reporting date, the Fund shall measure the loss allowance on financial assets at amortised cost (Cash and cash equivalents and receivables) at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses if the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition. If, at the reporting date, the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Fund shall measure the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month expected credit losses. Significant financial difficulties of the counter party, probability that the counter party will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default in payments are all considered indicators that a loss allowance may be required. If the credit risk increases to the point that it is considered to be credit impaired, interest income will be calculated based on the gross carrying amount adjusted for the loss allowance. A significant increase in credit risk is defined by management as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due. Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit impaired.

The Fund considers a financial asset to be in default when internal or external information indicates that the Fund is unlikely to receive the outstanding contractual amounts in full before taking into account any credit enhancements held by the Fund. A financial asset is written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the contractual cash flows.

(d) Net assets attributable to unit holders

Units are redeemable at the unit holders' option; however, applications and redemptions may be suspended by the Responsible Entity if it is in the best interests of the unit holders. The units are classified as equity.

The units can be put back to the Fund at any time for cash based on the redemption price. The units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at balance sheet date if the holder exercises the right to put them back to the Fund.

The attribution managed investment trust regime ("AMIT") allows managed investment Trust ("MITs") to make an irrevocable choice to be an AMIT. The Fund adopted AMIT from 7 June 2019. Under AMIT income is attributed to unitholders on a fair and reasonable basis, as determined by the Responsible Entity.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and bank overdrafts.

2 Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

(e) Cash and cash equivalents (continued)

Payments and receipts relating to the purchase and sale of investment securities are classified as cash flows from operating activities, as movements in the fair value of these securities represent the Fund's main income generating activity.

(f) Investment income

(i) Interest revenue

Interest revenue on cash and cash equivalents is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on an accruals basis.

(ii) Dividends and distributions

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date with any related foreign withholding tax recorded as an expense. The Fund currently incurs withholding tax imposed by certain countries on investment income. Such income is recorded gross of withholding tax in the statement of comprehensive income.

Trust distributions are recognised on an entitlement basis.

(g) Expenses

All expenses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on an accruals basis.

(h) Income tax

Under current legislation, the Fund is not subject to income tax provided it attributes the entirety of its taxable income to its unitholders.

(i) Distributions

In accordance with the Fund Constitution, the Fund distributes income adjusted for amounts determined by the Responsible Entity, to unit holders by cash or reinvestment. The distributions are recognised in the statement of changes in equity.

(j) Increase/decrease in net asset attributable to unit holders

Income not distributed is included in net assets attributable to unit holders. Movements in net assets attributable to unit holders are recognised in the statement of changes in equity.

(k) Due to brokers

Amounts due from/to brokers represent receivables for securities sold and payables for securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet delivered by period end. Trades are recorded on trade date, and normally settled within two business days. For information on how impairment is assessed please refer to Note 2 (c)(v).

(l) Receivables and accrued income

Receivables may include amounts for dividends, interest and trust distributions. Dividends and trust distributions are accrued when the right to receive payment is established. Amounts are generally received within 30 days of being recorded as receivables. For more information on impairment, refer to Note 2(c)(v).

(m) Payables

Payables include liabilities and accrued expenses owing by the Fund which are unpaid as at the end of the reporting year.

A separate distribution payable is recognised in the statement of financial position as at the end of each reporting period where this amount remains unpaid as at the end of the reporting year.

(n) Applications and redemptions

Applications received for units in the Fund are recorded at the application value received prior to the issue of units in the Fund. Redemptions from the Fund are recorded at redemption value payable after the cancellation of units redeemed.

(o) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The GST incurred on the costs of various services provided to the Fund by third parties such as investment management fees and transaction costs have been passed onto the Fund. The Fund qualifies for Reduced Input Tax Credits (RITC) at a rate of 55% or 75%; hence all expenses have been recognised in the statement of comprehensive income net of the amount of GST recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Accounts payable are inclusive of GST. The net amount of GST recoverable from the ATO is included in receivables in the balance sheet. Cash flows relating to GST are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis.

(p) Rounding of amounts

The Fund is an entity of a kind referred to in *ASIC Corporations (Rounding in Financial/Directors' Reports) Instrument 2016/191* relating to the "rounding off" of amounts in the financial statements. Amounts in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars unless otherwise indicated.

(q) Use of estimates

The Fund makes estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities within the current and next financial year. Estimates are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

2 Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

(q) Use of estimates (continued)

The Fund's financial assets and liabilities are not subject to significant judgement or complexity. Investments are in listed equities valued using independent pricing sources and cash and cash equivalents are held with financial institutions with a rating of AA or higher. Where listed equities have no active market, fair value is determined with reference to external observable information.

3 Financial risk management

The Fund's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks including market risk (which incorporates price risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Fund's overall risk management programme focuses on ensuring compliance with the Fund's Product Disclosure Statement and the investment guidelines of the Fund. It also seeks to maximise the returns derived for the level of risk to which the Fund is exposed and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the Fund's financial performance. The Fund's policy allows it to use derivative financial instruments in managing its financial risks.

All investments present a risk of loss of capital. The maximum loss of capital on forward currency contracts is limited to the notional contract values of those positions.

The Fund uses different methods to measure different types of risk to which it is exposed. These methods are explained below.

(a) Market risk

(i) Price risk

The Fund is exposed to price risk on equity securities listed or quoted on recognised securities exchanges. Price risk arises from investments held by the Fund for which prices in the future are uncertain.

Price risk is mitigated through diversification and a careful selection of securities within specified limits. The Fund's overall market positions and compliance with exposure limits and guidelines is monitored on a daily basis by the Investment Manager and reported to the Investment Committee. Compliance with the PDS and the Fund Constitution is reported to the Responsible Entity Compliance Committee and, ultimately, the Board.

The table at Note 3(b) summarises the sensitivities of the Fund's assets and liabilities to price risk. The analysis is based on the assumption that the equities in which the Fund invests moves by +/-15%.

(ii) Foreign exchange risk

The Fund operates internationally and holds both monetary and non-monetary assets dominated in currencies other than the Australian dollar. Foreign exchange risk arises as the value of monetary securities denominated in other currencies fluctuate due to changes in exchange rates. The foreign exchange risk relating to non-monetary assets and liabilities is a component of price risk and not foreign exchange risk. However, the Investment Manager monitors the exposure of all foreign currency denominated assets and liabilities.

Foreign exchange risk is managed by entering into forward currency contracts that hedge any movement in exchange rates with respect to the Australian dollar.

The table below summarises the fair value of the Fund's financial assets and liabilities, monetary and non-monetary, which are denominated in a currency other than the Australian dollar.

The Fund had no direct foreign exchange risk as at 30 June 2024.

The Fund determines the economic relationship between the hedged currency and the forward currency contract by the active market that exists for the relationship. The hedge ratio is determined by the Investment Manager at its discretion. Hedge ineffectiveness may arise where the amount of currency exposure being hedged changes due to a change in value of the underlying equities. The Fund may discontinue a hedging relationship where the risk of the change in underlying currency is mitigated by changes to the portfolio of equities or price movement of the underlying currency.

(iii) Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The amount of cash held by the Fund may vary dependent upon the judgement of the Investment Manager and the level of recent capital flows into and out of the Fund. At reporting date an increase of 100 basis points in floating interest rates would increase the Fund's operating profit and net assets attributable to unit holders by \$76,281 annually (2024: \$86,621). A decrease of 100 basis points in floating interest rates would have an equal but opposite effect. This includes the Fund's holding in a cash exchange traded fund. The Fund does not have borrowings or other financial assets or liabilities with direct exposure to changes in interest rates.

(iv) Market making risk

The Responsible Entity, on behalf of the Fund, provides liquidity to investors by acting as a buyer and seller of the Funds units on the ASX. Market making risk is the risk of an error in the execution or settlement of the underlying Fund units. The Responsible Entity, on behalf of the Fund, mitigates this risk by having the power to increase the spread at which it makes a market and the right to cease making a market (subject to its obligations under AQUA Rules and ASX Operating Rules). The Responsible Entity has appointed an independent market participant to act as its agent to transact and facilitate settlement on its behalf.

(b) Summarised sensitivity analysis

The following table summarises the sensitivity of the Fund's operating profit before finance costs attributable to unitholders and net assets attributable to unit holders to market risks. The reasonably possible movements in the risk variables have been determined based on management's best estimate, having regard to a number of factors, including historical levels of changes in foreign exchange rates, interest rates and the historical correlation of the Fund's investments with the relevant benchmark and market volatility. However, actual movements in the risk variables may be greater or less than anticipated due to a number of factors, including unusually large market movements resulting from changes in the performance of and/or correlation between the performances of the economies, markets and securities in which the Fund invests. As a result, historic variations in risk variables should not be used to predict future variances in the risk variables.

(c) Credit risk

The Fund is exposed to credit risk, which is the risk that a counterparty will be unable to pay its obligations in full when they fall due, causing a financial loss to the Fund.

The Fund does not have a significant concentration of credit risk that arises from an exposure to a single counterparty or group of counterparties having similar characteristics. The main concentration of credit risk, to which the Fund is exposed, arises from cash and cash equivalents and amounts due from brokers balances. None of these assets are impaired nor past their due date. The maximum exposure to credit risk at the reporting date is the carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents and amounts due from brokers.

(i) Settlement of securities transactions

All transactions in listed securities are settled/paid for upon delivery using approved brokers. The risk of default is considered low, as delivery of securities sold is only made once the broker has received payment. Payment is made once the securities purchased have been received by the broker. The trade will fail if either party fails to meet its obligations.

(ii) Cash and cash equivalents

The exposure to credit risk for cash and cash equivalents is low as all counterparties have at least a rating of AA.

(iii) Other

The Fund is not materially exposed to credit risk on other financial assets.

(d) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund may not be able to generate sufficient cash resources to settle its obligations in full as they fall due or can only do so on terms that are materially disadvantageous.

Exposure to liquidity risk for the Fund may arise from the requirement to meet daily unit holder redemption requests or to fund foreign exchange related cash flow requirements.

Liquidity risk is mitigated by holding investments listed on the ASX and maintaining sufficient cash and reserves to meet its normal operating requirements.

In order to manage the Fund's overall liquidity, the Responsible Entity has the discretion to reject an application for units and to defer or adjust redemption of units if the exercise of such discretion is in the best interests of unit holders. The Fund did not reject or withhold any redemptions during the year.

7 Derivative financial instruments

In the normal course of business, the Fund enters into transactions in various derivative financial instruments which have certain risks. A derivative is a financial instrument or other contract which is settled at a future date and whose value changes in response to the change in a specified interest rate, financial instrument price, commodity price, foreign exchange rate, index of prices or rates, credit rating or credit index or other variable.

Derivative financial instruments require no initial net investment or an initial net investment that is smaller than would be required for other types of contracts that would be expected to have a similar response to changes in market factors.

Derivative transactions include many different instruments such as forwards, futures and options. Derivatives are considered to be part of the investment process and the use of derivatives is part of the Fund's portfolio management. Derivatives are not managed in isolation. The use of derivatives includes:

- hedging to protect an asset or liability of the Fund against a fluctuation in market values, foreign exchange risk or to reduce volatility;
- adjusting asset exposures within the parameters set in the investment strategy and adjusting the duration of fixed interest portfolios or the weighted average maturity of cash portfolios.

The Fund holds the following derivatives:

a. Forward currency contracts

Forward currency contracts are primarily used by the Fund to economically hedge against foreign currency exchange rate risks on its non-Australian dollar denominated trading securities. The Fund agrees to receive or deliver a fixed quantity of foreign currency for an agreed upon price on an agreed future date. Forward currency contracts are valued at the prevailing last traded price at the end of each reporting period. The Fund recognises a gain or loss equal to the change in fair value at the end of each reporting period.
