



## September 2025 Quarterly Activities Report and Trading Update

DXN Limited (“DXN” or “the Company”), a prefabricated modular data centre specialist, is pleased to provide an operational and financial update for the quarter ending 30 September 2025 (the “September Quarter” or “Q1 FY26”).

### Key Highlights

- **Modular backlog orders of \$6.2 million as at 30 September 2025, supported by a growing pipeline of identified projects for FY26, contributing to a total Company backlog of \$11.9 million.**
- **Revenue for the quarter was \$0.94 million, reflecting a temporary decrease of 68.8% on the prior corresponding period (pcp), primarily due to customer-driven project deferrals. With project activity resuming and milestones scheduled for the coming quarters, revenue is expected to strengthen as deferred work is delivered.**
- **Cash balance of \$2.4 million as at 30 September 2025.**
- **Data Centre as a Service (“DCaaS”) project delivery remains on track, with site construction scheduled for completion by the end of October, marking the achievement of the final project milestone. DCaaS service fees are expected to commence from November 2026, establishing a new stream of recurring revenue.**
- **Asia-Pacific expansion strategy strengthened with the onboarding of dedicated sales and engineering talent, enhancing regional capability and positioning DXN for accelerated growth and new customer opportunities across key markets.**
- **Highly confident in delivering FY26 revenue growth, albeit 2HFY26 weighted.**

**Shalini Lagrutta, Managing Director of DXN, commented,** “We experienced an extraordinary convergence of events in Q1 with three major clients simultaneously deferring project work; this was an unprecedented occurrence in our operating history. This temporary revenue dip stems purely from client-side timing adjustments, not from any underlying operational weaknesses.

“Our long-term trajectory remains firmly on course. We are confident we can deliver FY26 revenue growth, although this will be skewed towards the second half of FY26. We continue to make foundational advances in market structuring, talent acquisition, and product innovation, all of which position us for significant growth.

“Our new DCaaS division is poised for a landmark milestone, with the inaugural site on the verge of going live. We have received strong validation of this project, with a client describing the site “as their best global model to date”. This powerful endorsement highlights our leadership in the DCaaS space and our ability to deliver scalable, high-value solutions that resonate with major partners eventuating into future repeat work.

“A significant portion of our efforts this quarter has been dedicated to structuring the Company for sustained success in the Asia-Pacific region. These structural enhancements will enable us to capitalise on emerging opportunities and drive regional expansion. To support our growth ambition we have bolstered our team, resulting in a meaningful increase in our sales pipeline.”

## Q1 Financials

DXN closed Q1 with a healthy backlog book of \$11.9 million as at 30 September 2025 and a growing pipeline of new opportunities that provides confidence in revenue acceleration in the coming quarters. Q1 revenue was \$0.94 million, down 68.8% on pcp, reflecting timing shifts in project delivery rather than any loss of contracted revenue. Three major customer milestones were deferred, with a portion expected to be realised in Q2 as project activity has recommenced. The Company closed the quarter with a cash balance of \$2.4 million, which was temporarily affected by slower project execution and delayed milestone receipts. Cash generation is expected to strengthen as project delivery progresses, and contracted milestone payments are received.

Operating cash flow for the September quarter was \$(428,000), compared with \$60,000 in the June quarter. The movement primarily reflects a slowdown in project progress during the period, due to the combination of deferred milestone receipts and the timing of supplier payments relating to work completed in the prior quarter. Notwithstanding these timing effects, the Company maintains disciplined working capital management and prudent cost control and continues to manage cash flows and stakeholder relationships to support project delivery in future periods.

## Operating highlights

Modular Data Centre revenue totalled approximately \$0.3 million during the September quarter, reflecting a temporary decrease on pcp, primarily due to slower-than-planned project progress. Activity during the quarter was impacted by delayed progress across the Globalstar, Ventia and DP World projects; however, these projects remain active with revenue now expected to be recognised in subsequent quarters as delivery momentum improves.

A key internal development has been the evolution of DXN's Strutcore product line. Originally tailored for telco solutions, the Company has invested considerable time and resources, in close collaboration with hyperscale customers with the aim to adapt the solution for broader hyperscale applications. This work aligns directly with commitments made during DXN's October 2024 capital raise and positions the Company to address a critical market need of delivering off-site build solutions for hyperscalers facing shortages in on-site resources. The Company anticipates these advancements will translate into new deals, further strengthening DXN's competitive edge.

DXN's Data Centre Operations delivered revenue of approximately \$0.7 million in Q1 FY26, a 3.7% improvement on pcp.

DXN has successfully completed site construction and installation for its first Data Centre as a Service (DCaaS). Utilities to the site including power and internet are expected to go live by the end of October once this is achieved, service fees are scheduled to commence from early November. This deployment forms part of DXN's inaugural DCaaS agreement with a US-based global satellite provider.

## Related Party Payments

The aggregate payments to related parties and their associates totalled \$156,000. These payments consisted of fees, salaries and superannuation to the managing and non-executive directors.

## Outlook

Q1 commenced slower than anticipated, due to unforeseen circumstances that saw project deferrals from three customers. Despite an unfavourable start the Company expects to recognise the revenue in upcoming quarters, this combined with strong activity behind the scenes, positions DXN with a clear runway for growth. The Company's \$11.9 million total backlog provides a solid foundation as it actively pursues opportunities across its core prefabricated modular segments and pursues opportunities in the DCaaS space. Together, this backlog and an increasingly active pipeline underpin the Company's confidence in delivering revenue growth in FY26, albeit weighted towards 2HFY26.

Besides business-as-usual growth in our regular product and market segment targets, a key factor of DXN's FY26 growth outlook is geographical expansion leveraging our existing global customer portfolio, specifically into Southeast Asian markets including Singapore, Malaysia and Indonesia. This will cover all products in the Modular market segment and DCaaS segment.

Therefore, the current level of net operating cash flows is not expected to remain constant. Cash flows will vary based on the stage and progress of projects, including milestones achieved and the timing of customer payments.
