QUARTERLY ACTIVITY REPORT AND APPENDIX 4C FOR Q2 FY26¹

- Positive cashflow from operating activities for FY26 half year.
- Pentrox revenue up \$2.3 million².

Medical Developments International (ASX: MVP) today released its Appendix 4C and Quarterly Activity Report for the quarter ended 31 December 2025 (Q2 FY26).

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Group revenue for Q2 FY26 was \$10.7 million, \$0.2 million lower than the prior corresponding period (pcp). Revenue for the first half of FY26 (H1 FY26) was \$21.6 million, \$1.6 million higher than the pcp.

Pain Management revenue was \$7.4 million for the quarter, up \$0.4 million on the pcp. Revenue for H1 FY26 was \$2.3 million higher than the pcp. Half year volume was stronger in Australia, driven by growth in the Australian hospital segment and timing of sales into the ambulance segment. European volumes were stronger, due to growth in underlying demand and inventory stocking in France following transition of supply to a partner from 1 July 2025. Shipments to other international partners were also stronger in the period. Pricing in Australia was higher, and as expected, transfer prices into France were lower, following the transition to partner supply.

Respiratory revenue was \$3.2 million for the quarter, down \$0.6 million on the pcp. The benefit of higher pricing in the US, reflecting pass through of tariff costs incurred to date, was offset by lower volumes. Demand in the US continued to demonstrate softness.

The Group generated \$1.1 million cash from operating activities during Q2 FY26. Receipts from customers were \$10.5 million, \$0.5 million improved on the pcp, reflecting growth in Pentrox volumes.

Payments to suppliers and employees in the quarter were \$9.4 million, an increase of \$1.3 million on the pcg due mainly to higher Pentrox volumes.

Cash from operating activities for H1 FY26 was \$0.3 million, improved on the \$0.8 million used in the pcg.

Cash used in investing activities during the quarter was \$0.2 million, and cash used in financing activities was \$0.1 million.

Cash at 31 December 2025 was \$16.9 million.

MVP's CEO Brent MacGregor said, *"We are pleased to report positive operating cashflow in our first half. We have continued to make good progress in growing our lead product, Pentrox, while maintaining strong cost discipline. While demand in our Respiratory segment was soft, and US tariffs drove input costs in this segment higher, pricing initiatives have helped mitigate the impact to cashflows in the period."*

FY26 OUTLOOK

In FY26 the Group will:

- Increase investment in growth initiatives to embed Pentrox as a standard of care.
- Continue to engage with and support new and existing partners to increase Pentrox penetration and leverage the new paediatric label in select markets, following approval.
- Continue momentum in work already underway in commercialising Pentrox in Australia.

The investment in growth initiatives and the change in Pentrox distribution in France and Switzerland will likely result in softer Underlying EBIT in FY26 versus the prior year. These initiatives are expected to deliver stronger financial performance over the long-term.

UPDATE ON FY26 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Accelerate penetration of Pentrox in Australia

The Group continued to implement several medical and commercial initiatives that are strengthening clinical engagement and supporting increased adoption in the hospital segment. Pentrox is increasingly becoming a recognised treatment option here.

First half volume in the Australian hospital segment was up 26% on the pcg.

In October 2025, the PBS added Nurse Practitioners to the Prescriber Bag criteria for Pentrox – an important healthcare professional group who now have expanded access to Pentrox.

Grow Pentrox in Europe

European in-market demand for Pentrox for the first half was up 10% versus the pcg.

Approvals for the extension of the indication for Pentrox to include children ages 6 years and older (from the current indication of 18 years and older) are progressing to plan.

In August 2025, Health Products Regulatory Agency (HPRA), as the Reference Body (Ireland) for the EU Decentralised Procedure (DCP), approved the extension of the indication for Pentrox. All

member states, except the UK, Czechia, and Slovakia, have subsequently granted medicines approval. The device approval is expected by the end of February 2026. All remaining regulatory approvals are expected by August 2026. Extension of the indication will broaden the addressable market for Pentrox.

During the period the MAGPIE paediatric study was published in *Injury*.

Enhance margins and deliver operational efficiencies

The Group increased Pentrox pricing in Australia to customers that had not received a price increase in FY25 (around 25% of volume) in July 2025. This is expected to improve margins by ~\$1 million in FY26. Operating costs continue to be well-controlled.
