## Second batch of Assays Confirm High-Grade, Shallow Gold Mineralisation Open @ Depth @ Grace Gold-Copper Project

### HIGHLIGHTS

- The second batch of assays for 6 (out of 18) drill-holes from Phase I of the comprehensive 8,500m RC drilling campaign at the Grace Gold-Copper Project all intersected shallow zones of wide gold mineralisation within a 1.3km strike length, with the best results including:
  - ❖ **19m @ 3.53g/t Au from 40m (25GRC006)**
  - ❖ **7m @ 1.09g/t Au from 27m (25GRC009)**
  - ❖ **6m @ 3.04g/t Au from 102m (25GRC010)**
  - ❖ **15m @ 2.93g/t Au from 13m including 5m @ 7.16 g/t Au from 15m (25GRC011)**
- All holes from the program to date have intersected strong mineralisation which remains open at depth.
- Assay results for the remaining 7 drill-holes will be released as soon as received from the laboratory
- The Board is now working on commencing Phase II of the drilling campaign, comprising a minimum 32 drill-holes for approximately 6,000m
- Once the full drilling campaign is completed and results analysed, the geology team will recalibrate the current Inferred Mineral Resource Estimate (MRE) – 1.59mt @ 1.35g/t Au for 69,000oz which will be based on a 1.3km strike length to ~ 200m depth (vs 500m & -75m average depth)

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**Paterson's Executive Director, Mr Matt Bull said:** *"We couldn't have asked for a better outcome from the second batch of assay results from the Grace Gold-Copper Project. Notably, they provide further confirmation the underlying gold system is high-grade, shallow and open at depth. The Board is looking forward to receiving the final batch of assays from Phase I, which will provide further insights on the extent of gold mineralisation within the underlying system. Overall, the Board is excited with the results received so far, as they are significantly better than initial expectations."*

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**PHASE I ASSAYS HIGHLIGHTING SHALLOW GOLD MINERALISATION**

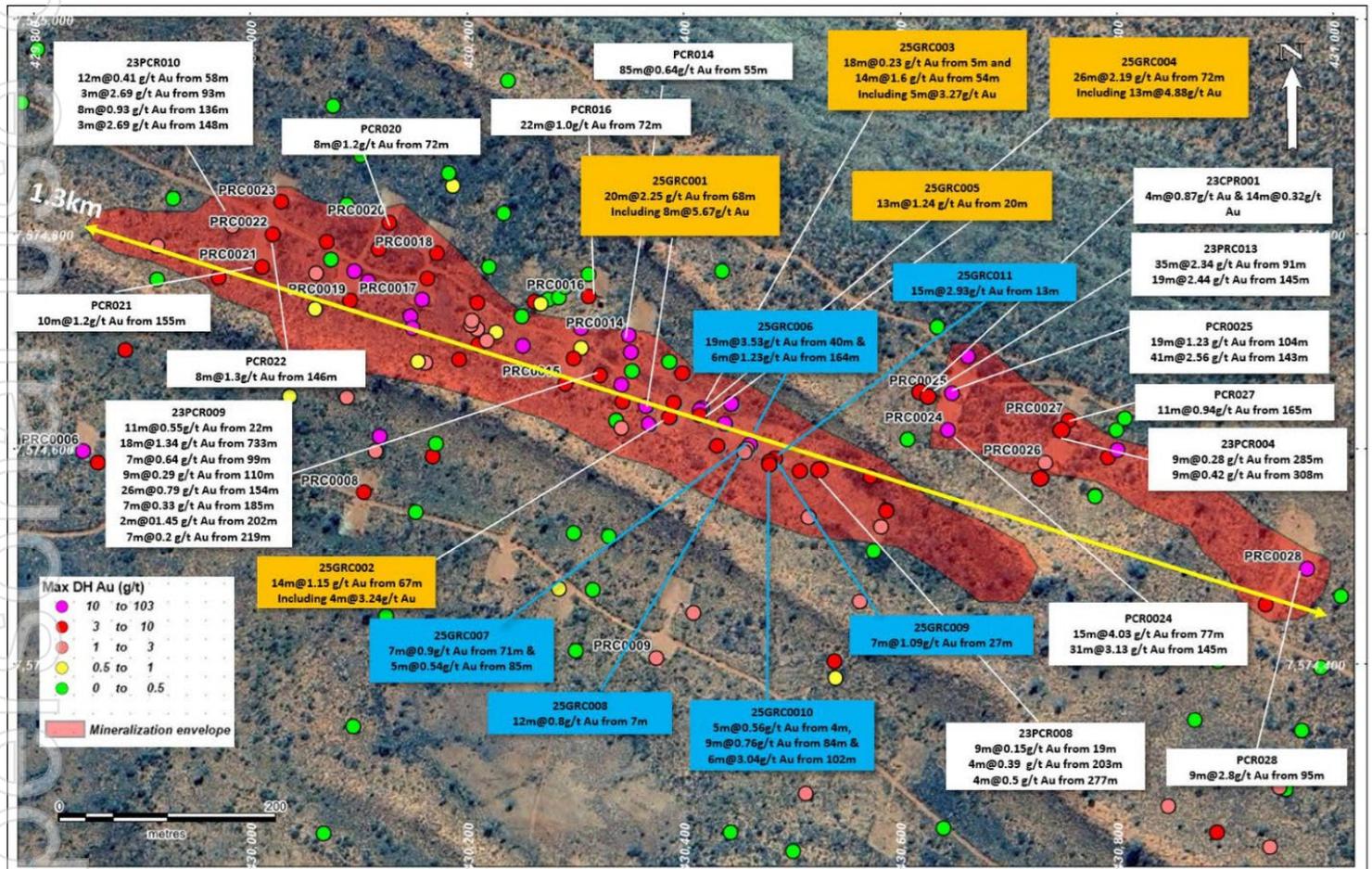


Figure 1: 11 assay results from Phase I drilling campaign at Grace Gold-Copper Project

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Paterson Resources Limited ("Paterson" or "Company") (ASX: PSL) is pleased to advise the second batch of assay results (6 out of 18) from Phase I of the comprehensive 8,500m Reverse Circulation (RC) drilling campaign continued to demonstrate shallow zones of wide gold mineralisation along a 1.3km strike length (Figure 1 & Appendix A).

The results of the program to date provide further evidence of high grade, shallow gold mineralisation which is open at depth (Figure 1). Notably, the result from the program to date include **20m @ 2.25 g/t** from 68m 25GRC001, **26m @ 2.19m** from 72m i25GRC04 and **19m @ 3.53 g/t** from 40m 25GRC006.

The assay results for the remaining 7 drill-holes are still being processed and will be released once they are received and interpreted.

## Phase II onwards

Current plans remain unchanged and once ground conditions allow, Phase II of the drilling campaign will commence, with a minimum 32 drillholes for 6,000m planned. The objective remains testing extensions of known mineralisation and potentially recalibrating / upgrading the current Inferred MRE (**1.59mt @ 1.35g/t Au for 69,000oz\***).

The second batch of assays provides further evidence the Grace Gold-Copper Project is in a highly mineral-rich province and has enormous potential for a simple, shallow, oxide processing circuit. Once the drilling campaign is completed, the Board expects to commission a Scoping Study to fully assess the Grace Gold-Copper Project's potential which will include assessing the optimal path to production and potential strategic partners.

### Grace Gold-Copper Project, Paterson Province

The Grace Gold-Copper Project is in the heart of the highly prospective Paterson Province, where numerous large groups including Rio Tinto, Antipa Minerals and Greatland Gold are actively exploring the region. Significant discoveries proximal to Paterson's Grace Gold Project include the Havieron 8.5-million-ounce gold-copper resource being developed by Greatland Gold, Cyprum Metal's Maroochydore copper prospect to the south and Greatland's world-class 30-plus million-ounce Telfer gold-copper mine, located 25km to the north.

The previous drilling campaigns in 2022-23<sup>&</sup> (Figure 2) resulted in the discovery of a thick high-grade gold shoot and produced significant intercepts, previously reported, including:

- 15m @ 4.03g/t Au from 77m including **6m @ 9.3g/t Au** from 79m (PRC0024)
- 31m @ 3.13g/t Au from 145m including **7m @ 11.0g/t Au** from 148m (PRC0024)
- 19m @ 1.23g/t Au from 104m including **2m @ 5.9g/t Au** from 106m (PRC0025)
- 41m @ 2.56g/t Au from 143m including **4m @ 9.2g/t Au** from 143m and **3m @ 8.7g/t Au** from 176m (PRC0025)
- 35m @ 2.34 g/t Au from 91m including **17m @ 4.57 g/t Au** from 98m which includes **1m @ 46.2 g/t Au** from 105m and **19m @ 2.44 g/t Au** from 145m including **2m @ 10.23 g/t Au** from 149m (23PRC013)
