The Board and management of Shriro Holdings Limited (the “Company”) and its subsidiaries (collectively the “Group”) are committed to effective corporate governance in order to ensure accountability and transparency to shareholders and other stakeholders, including customers, employees and regulatory bodies. The Company has adopted, and has substantially complied with, the ASX Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations (Fourth Edition) (‘the Recommendations’) to the extent appropriate to the size and nature of the Group’s operations.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Group is a leading consumer products marketing and distribution group operating in Australia, New Zealand, the United States, and China. The Group is also expanding internationally and exports its barbeques, pizza ovens and cooling products to 27 countries globally.

The Group markets and distributes an extensive range of Company-owned brands (including Everdure, Robinhood, Omega and Omega Altise) and third party owned brands (including Casio, Pioneer, Grohe, American Standard, Manhattan Portage and myAir.0).

Products include calculators, watches, musical instruments, bathtubs, sanitary ware, taps, shower fittings, audio products, kitchen appliances, laundry products, consumer electronics, car audio, professional DJ equipment, Hi-Fi/speakers, gas heaters, gas barbeques, charcoal barbeques, pizza ovens, electric heaters, cooling products, computer accessories, and bags and backpacks.

Shriro reported revenue of \$60.6M, up 8.4% on the previous corresponding period ('pcp'), primarily driven by a rebound from a low base in seasonal product sales and strong retailer and consumer reception of newly developed pizza oven products. Growth in Casio Australia and New Zealand was modest, reflecting subdued retail conditions for consumer discretionary products.

Australian watch sales were flat compared to the prior year despite the decision to cease supplying a third-party online sales channel, which had been a significant contributor in FY25. This strategic adjustment has strengthened relationships with bricks-and-mortar retailers and enabled sales to be maintained, notwithstanding excess inventory in this online channel. The overall Casio business remained resilient, delivering modest growth in Australia. Stock levels are low, positioning the business well for growth in the second half.

In New Zealand, consumer market conditions remained subdued; however, early signs of improvement are emerging. Revenue grew 2%, supported by strong performance in the appliances business. Overall, the business has remained resilient through

weak economic conditions. In contrast, the plumbing division of Grohe and American Standard continues to be challenging due to the inability to secure a large anchor retailer in a difficult market to support the brands and justify further investment.

Gross margin was negatively impacted by increased sales of lower-margin seasonal products (which carry significantly lower operating costs), clearance of excess inventory in the USA subsidiary as part of the transition to a new distributor, and supplier price increases in watch and calculator products. These impacts were partially offset by currency tailwinds.

The strategic transformation of the Seasonal business has progressed more slowly than initially planned in the USA, as uncertainty arising from changing tariff rates on exports from China to the USA resulted in lower than anticipated orders. The global new product development strategy has also been delayed due to compliance issues requiring design alterations. Completion is still expected by the end of the financial year; however, the delay will impact sales to Europe and the USA during their summer period in the second half of FY26. Shriro remains committed to ensuring products are fully tested and that feedback is incorporated prior to mass production.

Operating expenses decreased 2.5% to \$15.4M, primarily due to reduced ERP expenditure. This reduction was partially offset by foreign exchange losses compared with gains in the prior period, representing a net variance of approximately \$0.4M. Seasonal business efficiencies also improved following the transition to a lower capital-intensive model in FY26, with manufacturing and wholesaling outsourced globally. Shriro's focus in the Seasonal business segment remains on supply chain management, marketing, product design, and tooling investment protected by trademarks and patents.

While significant overhead reductions have been achieved over the past three years, further cost savings are expected, particularly in lease and IT expenses.

EBITDA increased 5.6% to \$11.4M, driven by sales growth and disciplined cost management.

Statement of financial position and statement of cashflows

The balance sheet remains strong. In the calendar year to 31 December 2025, Shriro returned \$23.9M to shareholders through dividends and completed two share buy-backs totalling \$20.0M (compared with \$22.6M returned in calendar year 2024). Over the two years to 31 December 2025, Shriro has returned \$46.5M to shareholders via buy-backs, capital returns, and dividends.

Shriro repurchased 7.9% of its shares in the first half of FY26 at a slight premium, with the buy-back fully subscribed and 6,172,839 shares cancelled. The \$5.0M buy-back was paid on 29 December 2025. The current issued share count is 71,724,313.

Operating cash flows for the period were \$5.7M (1H25: \$4.6M). Shriro ended the period with net cash of \$9.7M (\$24.7M pcp), net assets of \$35.1M (\$52.7M pcp), and tangible assets backing of 43.7 cents per share (51.6 cents pcp).

BUSINESS STRATEGY AND RISK

Strategies

Shriro will continue to place a high priority on growth opportunities and identifying any potential opportunities for cost rationalisation and savings to maximise shareholder returns.

The Group aims to continue to grow through:

- continual product development and range extensions;
- geographic expansion;
- channel diversification;
- mergers and acquisitions; and
- adding new third-party brands to the portfolio.

Risks

The key risks for the business are:

- change in consumer spending patterns throughout the year;
- customers or distributors delisting products;
- supply chain disruptions;
- deterioration in economic conditions;
- loss of brand distribution rights;
- performance of our sales distributors;
- loss of key personnel;
- changing tax and tariff rates;
- foreign exchange movements; and
- cyber incidents.

EARNINGS PER SHARE AND DIVIDENDS

The basic and diluted earnings per share are calculated using the weighted average number of shares. The Group has basic earnings per share of 8.5 cents (six months to 31 December 2024: 6.2 cents) and diluted earnings per share of 8.2 cents (six months to 31 December 2024: 6.1 cents).

On 26 February 2026, the Directors declared an interim dividend relating to the period ending 31 December 2025 of 2.0 cents per share fully franked with an ex-dividend date of 22 April 2026, a record date of 23 April 2026 and payable on 12 May 2026.

On 30 October 2025, the Group paid a special dividend of 3.0 cents per share fully franked.

SHARE BUY-BACK

On 22 December 2025, the Company completed an off-market equal access share buy-back whereby 6,172,839 shares, representing approximately 7.9% of the Company's issued capital, were bought back at \$0.81 per share (total \$5 million) and cancelled. The Company has 71,724,313 ordinary shares after the buy-back.

On 26 February 2026, it was announced the Company intends to proceed with a further off-market equal access share buy-back whereby the Company will buy back up to 18,518,518 shares, representing 25.82% of the Company's issued capital, at a price of \$0.81 per share. The buy-back is subject to the receipt of ASIC relief, an ASX Waiver, financing approval and final Board approval.

Basis of Preparation

Corporate information

The Condensed Half Year Financial Report was authorised for issue by the Directors on 26 February 2026 in accordance with a resolution of the Directors. Shriro is a for-profit company limited by shares incorporated in Australia whose shares are publicly traded on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX). The nature of operations and principal activities of the Group is to market and distribute kitchen appliances, laundry, bathroom and sanitaryware products, and consumer goods in Australia, New Zealand, the United States and to international customers.

Basis of preparation

The Condensed Half Year Financial Report comprises the Directors' Report and the half year consolidated financial statements. The half year consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with AASB 134 *Interim Financial Reporting* and the *Corporations Act 2001*. The half year consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of Shriro Holdings Limited and its subsidiaries as at 31 December 2025.

The Condensed Half Year Financial Report does not include all the information and disclosures required in the annual consolidated financial statements, and should be read in conjunction with the Group's Annual Report as at 30 June 2025.

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the half year consolidated financial statements are consistent with those followed in the preparation of the Group's annual consolidated financial statements for the period ended 30 June 2025. The Group has not early adopted any standard, interpretation or amendment that has been issued but is not yet effective. Several amendments and interpretations apply for the first time in the financial year ended 30 June 2025, but do not have an impact on the condensed half year consolidated financial statements of the Group.

The half year consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost, except for the measurement of derivative financial instruments and share based payment transactions, which have been measured at fair value. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars with all values rounded to the nearest thousand dollars unless otherwise stated in accordance with *ASIC Corporations (Rounding in Financials/Directors' Reports) Instrument 2016/191*.

1. Trading Operations

1.1 Segment information

1.1.1 Primary operating segments

Operating segments are reported in a manner which is consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision makers ('CODM'). The CODM has been identified as the Board of Directors of the Company. The internal reports reviewed by the CODM, which are used to evaluate the financial performance of the Group and make strategic decisions on at least a monthly basis, are separated into the Group's primary operating segments. Segment results are evaluated on a profit after tax and earnings before interest, tax and depreciation and amortisation basis. Geographical operating segments are based on the location of the customer.

- **Australia**
Home appliances, watches, calculators, electronic musical instruments, pizza ovens, and barbeques
- **New Zealand**
Home appliances, watches, calculators, electronic musical instruments, barbeques, pizza ovens and audio equipment
- **Rest of the world**
Cooling products, barbeques, pizza ovens and accessories

Forward foreign exchange contract derivatives are carried on the balance sheet at fair value and are included in level two of the fair value hierarchy. The fair value has been determined by reference to the relevant spot rate at period end, the fair value of forward exchange contracts is determined using forward exchange market rates at the end of the period. There have been no transfers between the levels in the fair value hierarchy (30 June 2025: none).

3. Investment and Financing

3.1 Borrowings

During the half year ended 31 December 2025, the Group had non-cash guarantee facilities of AUD\$7,000,000 for Australia and NZD\$3,000,000 for New Zealand. Under the terms of these facilities, financial institutions provide guarantees to the Group's suppliers and property owners in the form of Letters of Credit and Bank Guarantees. These Letters of Credit and Bank Guarantees act like insurance and provide assurance to suppliers and property owners that payment up to the amount of the guarantees will be made if certain documentary conditions are met. The Group has no obligation to make any payments under this non-cash facility.

At 31 December 2025 the Group did not have a cash facility in place (30 June 2025: none).

The Group's facilities are denominated in Australian and New Zealand dollars and variable interest rates apply. Either a fixed or floating charge has been granted over all assets of the Group, depending on the type of asset.

The facilities have financial covenants relating to fixed charge cover ratio, borrowing base cover ratio and leverage ratio. The Group is compliant with all financial covenants.

4.3 Dividends and share buy-back

On 22 December 2025, the Company completed an off-market equal access share buy-back whereby 6,172,839 shares, representing approximately 7.9% of the Company's issued capital, were bought back at \$0.81 per share (total \$5 million) and cancelled. The Company has 71,724,313 ordinary shares after the buy-back.

On 26 February 2026 the Directors declared an interim dividend of 2.0 cents per share fully franked with an ex-dividend date of 22 April 2026, a record date of 23 April 2026 and payable on 12 May 2026.

On 30 October 2025, the Group paid a special dividend of 3.0 cents per share fully franked.

5. Group Structure and Key Management

5.1 Key management personnel compensation

The remuneration of key management personnel is disclosed in the audited remuneration report which is included in the 2025 Annual Report.

During the half year ended 31 December 2025, CEO Tim Hargreaves was granted 397,875 performance rights (2025: 367,774) and CFO Shane Booth was granted 193,963 performance rights (2025: 179,289). The fair value of these rights is \$400,467 (2025: \$360,982).

Each performance right is a right to receive one fully paid ordinary share in the capital of the Company subject to the satisfaction of performance conditions, for nil consideration. The performance conditions are measured over a three-year period from 1 July 2025 to 30 June 2028.

The Board of Directors approves on an annual basis the amounts of compensation for Directors up to the shareholder approved limit and key management personnel with reference to the Group's performance and general compensation levels in equivalent companies and industries.

6. Other Notes

6.1 Events after the reporting date

On 26 February 2026, it was announced the Company intends to proceed with a further off-market equal access share buy-back whereby the Company will buy back up to 18,518,518 shares, representing 25.82% of the Company's issued capital, at a price of \$0.81 per share. The buy-back is subject to the receipt of ASIC relief, an ASX Waiver, financing approval and final Board approval.

Other than the matters disclosed in Note 4.3 of the Financial Report, there has been no other matter or circumstance, occurring subsequent to the end of the financial period, that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect, the operations of the Group, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Group in future financial years.

6.2 Changes to comparative information

Where management has considered it appropriate to achieve a more relevant and reliable presentation of the Group's financial performance, the presentation of certain items in the Condensed Half Year Financial Report has changed since the prior period. Where this re-presentation of results requires reclassification of comparative amounts, the comparatives have been re-presented to achieve more relevant and reliable presentation of comparability.

6.3 Commitments and contingencies

There has been no change in capital commitments, contingent liabilities, or contingent assets since the last annual reporting report.
