



Medcalf Lithium Resource increases 34%

- **Revised Medcalf lithium Inferred Mineral Resource Estimate ("MRE") grows significantly to 10.6Mt @ 1.0% Li₂O and 107ppm Ta₂O₅.³**
 - **very high tantalum grades with tantalum MRE 12.8Mt @ 112ppm Ta₂O₅.⁴**
 - **represents a 34% increase in contained Li₂O from the maiden Aug'25 MRE;¹**
 - **remains open at depth and along strike.**

Charger Metals NL (ASX: CHR, "Charger" or the "Company") is pleased to report the recent drilling program at its 100%-owned Lake Johnston Lithium Project ("Lake Johnston") in Western Australia, has resulted in a 34% growth in its **Medcalf Lithium MRE⁴**, increasing it to **10.6Mt @ 1.0% Li₂O and 107ppm Ta₂O₅**. The recent drilling has also resulted in an additional new **Medcalf Tantalum MRE⁵ of 2.2Mt @ 132ppm Ta₂O₅**. Importantly, Medcalf remains open along strike and at depth, and the company anticipates future drilling will convert to further resource growth.

In addition to this resource, the Medcalf West Lithium Prospect¹, immediately to the west of the Medcalf Lithium Deposit, has an Exploration Target of **3 – 5Mt @ 1.0% – 1.4% Li₂O and 100ppm to 150ppm Ta₂O₅**. Medcalf West also remains open along strike and at depth.

Charger's Managing Director, Bryan Dixon, commented:

"Charger is excited to have significantly increased the Mineral Resource at the Medcalf spodumene deposit to 10.6 million tonnes at 1.0% Li₂O for 106Kt contained Li₂O, which is 34% up on the maiden resource published 10 months ago. This has been achieved on less than 11,000m of RC and diamond drill drilling on relatively tight drill spacing of approximately 80m by 40m. We are confident it will continue to grow in size with further drilling, given the resources is open both down dip and along strike.

"From an economic view point we have added significant mineralisation within the 2025 pit optimisation at a US\$2,000/t SC6 price. 59% and 81% of the resource tonnes sit within 200m and 300m of surface respectively, making it a shallow lithium deposit which starts from surface.

"In addition, we also have a Medcalf West Exploration Target estimated from high-grade lithium-in-pegmatite drill intersections and pegmatite outcrops, which highlights the potential to significantly grow the near-surface Mineral Resource within the greater Medcalf target area. The fact that both Medcalf and Medcalf West remain open at depth further adds to the growth potential.

"Australia is the biggest lithium producer in the world, however lithium resources exceeding 10 million tonnes are still very rare in Australia. There are only six lithium deposits in Australia bigger than 10 million tonnes and not controlled by companies with market capitalisations less than a billion and only two in companies with less than \$100 million dollar market capitalisations. Medcalf is also one of the few Australian lithium projects with no offtake agreements in place providing significant funding opportunities.

"Both Medcalf and Medcalf West contain very high tantalum grade mineralisation. The nearby lithium concentrate plants are also separately producing tantalum oxide concentrates using simple gravity separation methods which demonstrates the potential for tantalum to be a valuable by-product.

The recent announcement of the sale of our Bynoe Project gives us the funding for further drilling as well as mining and processing studies to demonstrate the economics of the Lake Johnston Lithium Project."

The revised MRE was completed by Ashmore Advisory Pty Ltd ("Ashmore"). Results of the independent estimate by Ashmore are tabulated in the Statement of Mineral Resources in Table 1. The Statement of Mineral Resources is reported in line with requirements of the 2012 JORC Code and is therefore suitable for public reporting.

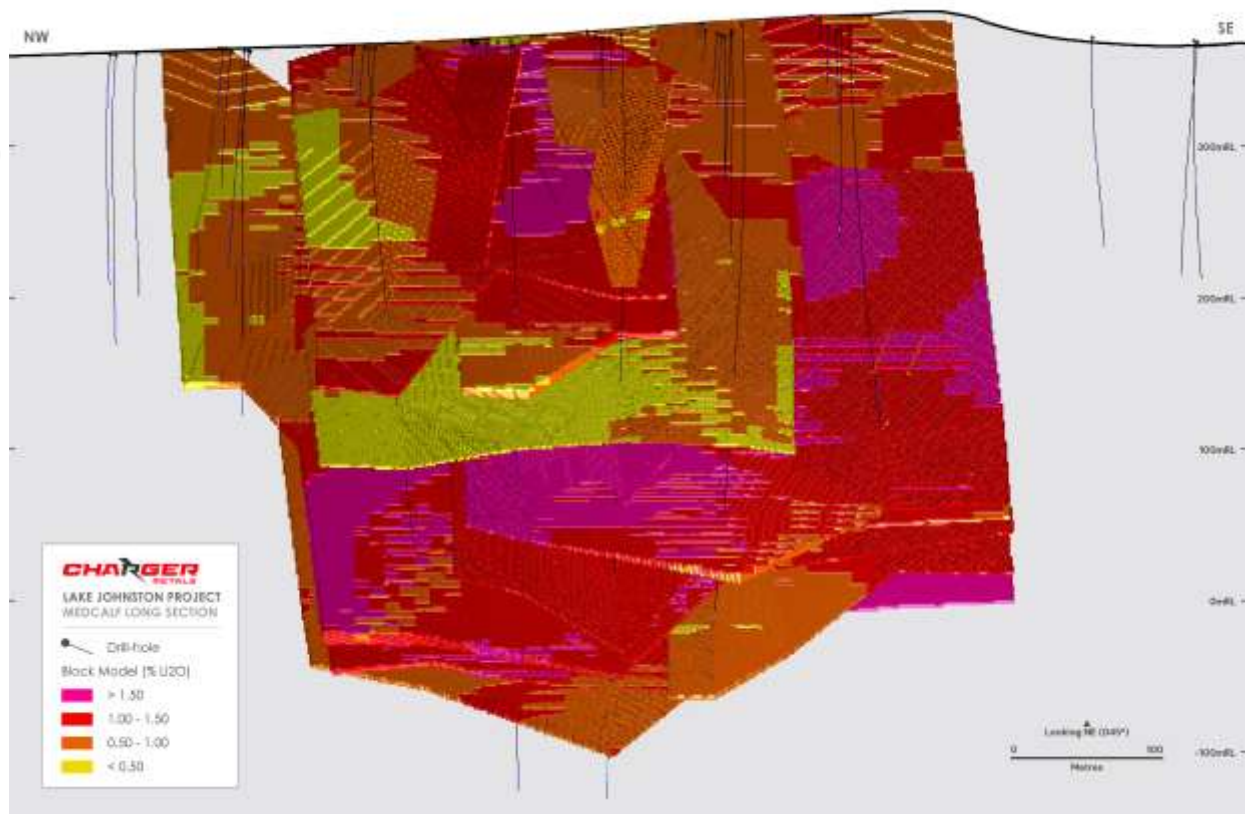


Figure 1. Long sectional view looking northeast of the Medcalf Lithium Mineral Resource.

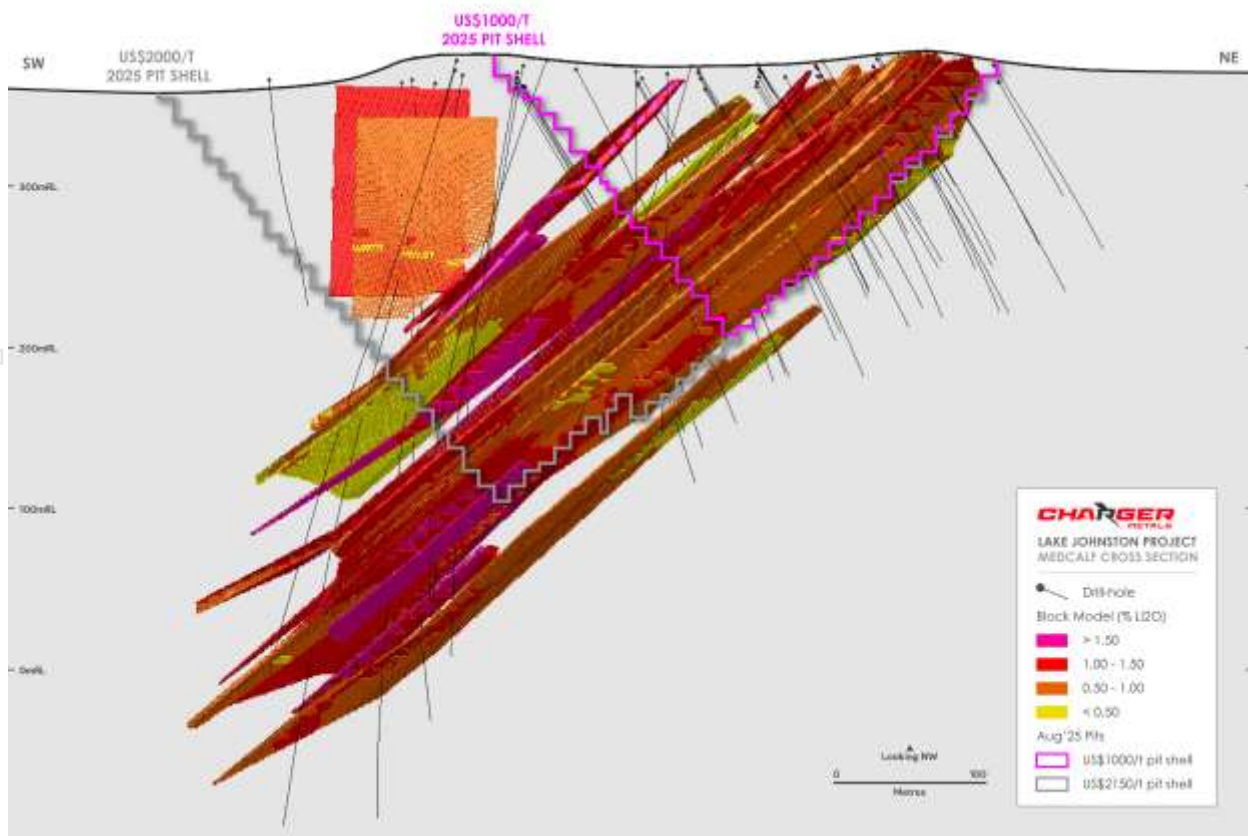


Figure 2. Oblique sectional view of the Medcalf Lithium Mineral Resource showing the 2025 pit optimisations based on SC6 US\$1,000/t and US\$2,000/t.

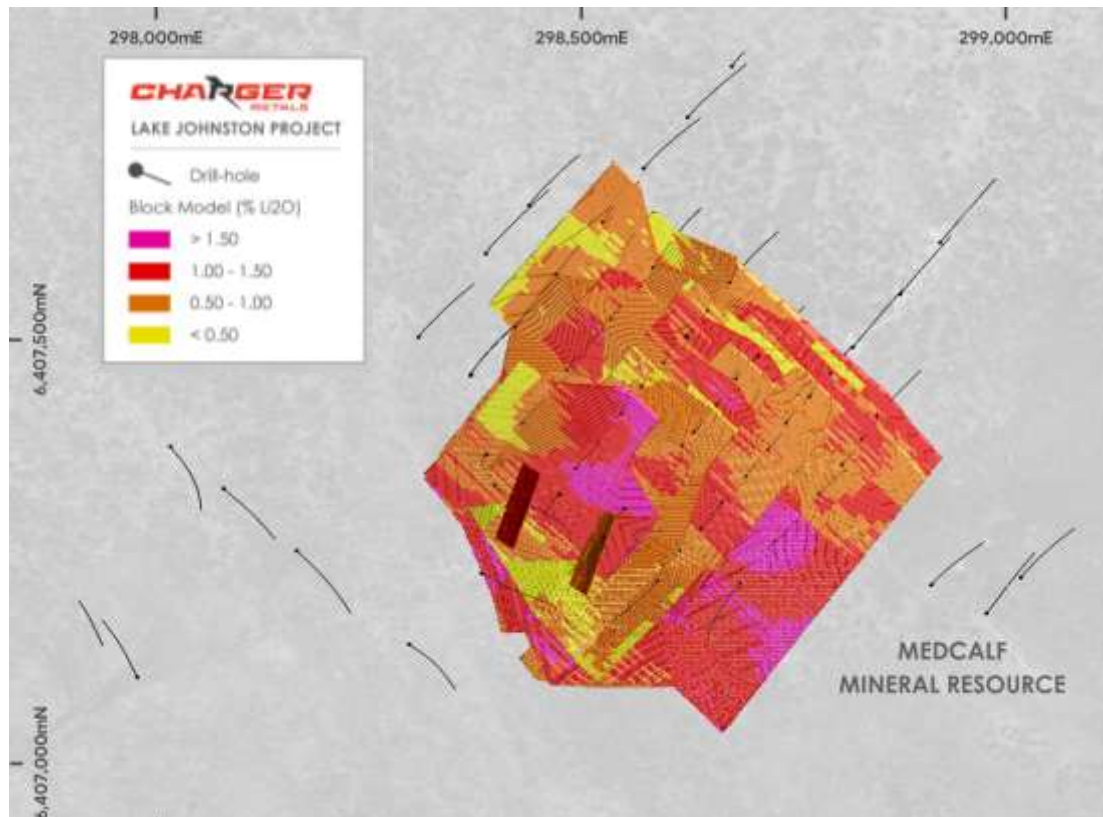


Figure 3. Plan view of the Medcalf 10.6Mt Lithium MRE.

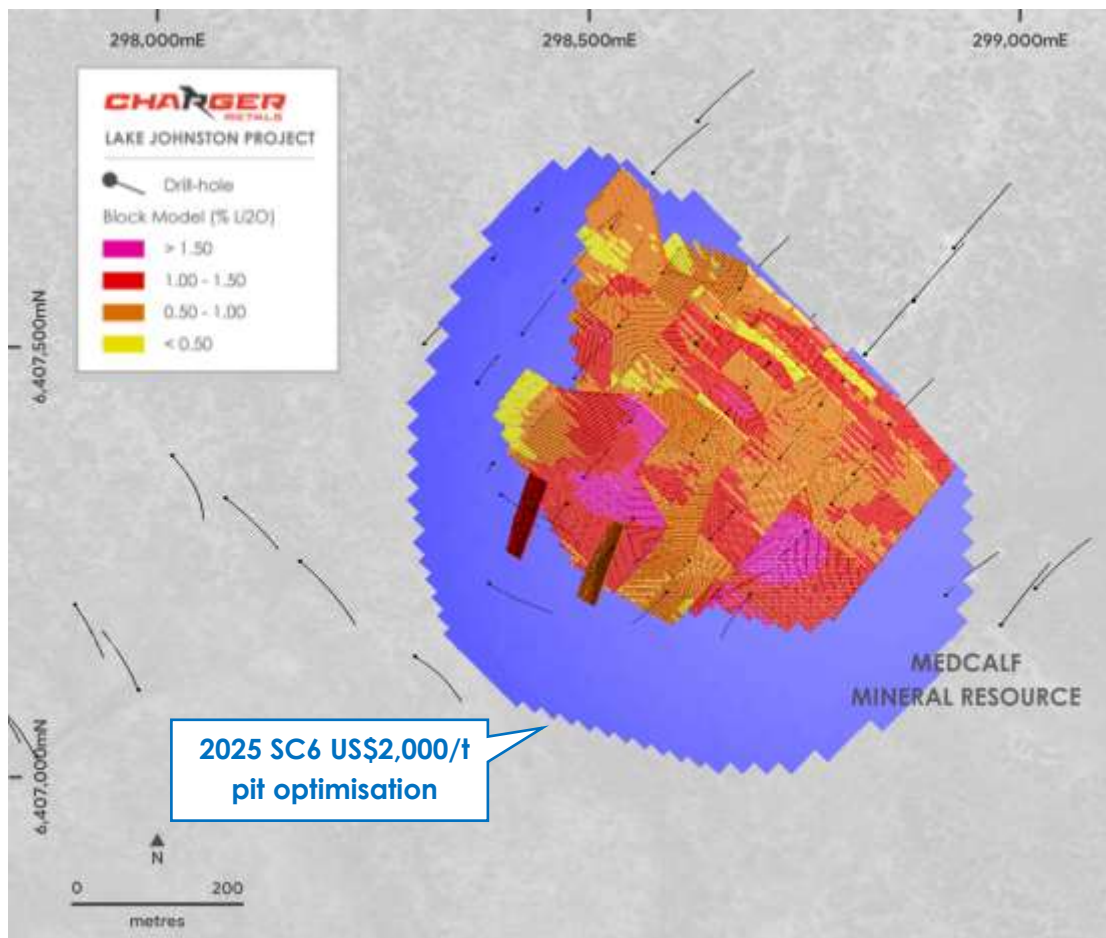


Figure 4. Plan of the Medcalf 10.6Mt Lithium MRE with the 2025 SC6 US\$2,000/t pit optimisation.

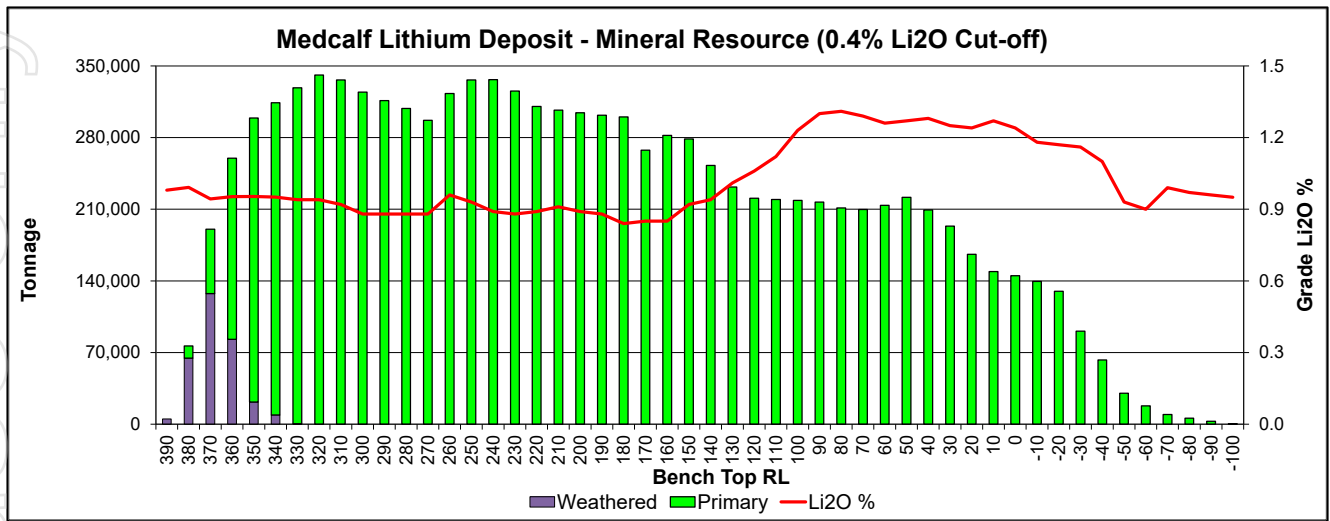


Figure 5 Medcalf Tonnage and Grade – 10m Bench Elevation

To show the tonnage and grade distribution throughout the entire deposit, a bench breakdown has been prepared using a 10m bench height which is shown graphically in Figure 5. 59% and 81% of the MRE tonnage sits in top 200m and 300m from surface, respectively.

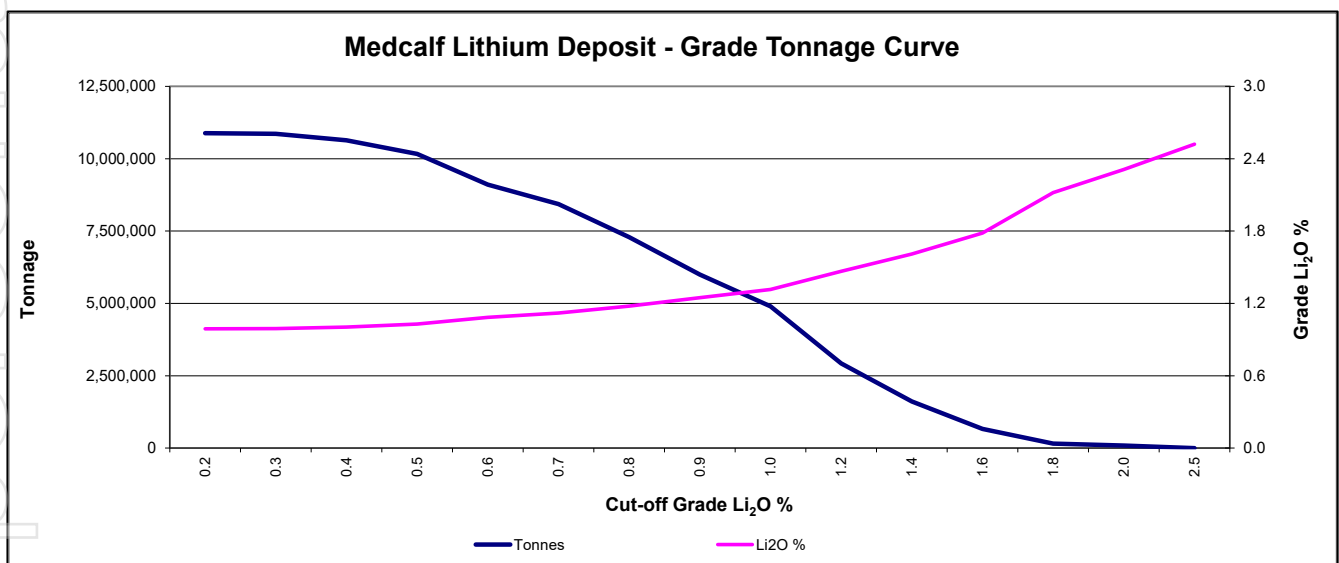


Figure 6. Medcalf Grade - Tonnage Curve

Medcalf West Exploration Target

The Medcalf West Exploration Target is based on the results of exploration activities undertaken to date and references an extensive dataset of drilling (approximately 130m to 200m spaced drill sections), geological surface mapping and surface sampling information. The drilling and surface sampling data form the basis for grade ranges; and tonnage factors were based on wireframes generated from drilling data, as well as mapped pegmatites and surface sampling grade within mapped pegmatites. Charger plans on conducting further drilling at Medcalf West in future work programs as soon as the DMPE Permit of Work is approved.

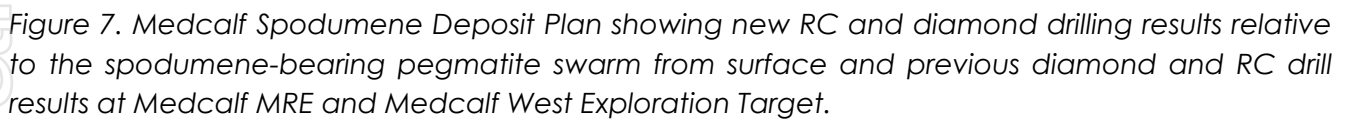

The locations of the Medcalf Mineral Lithium MRE and Medcalf West Lithium Exploration Target are shown in Figure 7.

The potential quantity and grade of the Medcalf West Exploration Target is conceptual in nature. There has been insufficient exploration to estimate a Mineral Resource. It is uncertain if further exploration will result in the estimation of a Mineral Resource. The Exploration Target has been prepared and reported in accordance with the 2012 edition of the JORC Code.



Geology and Geological Interpretation

The bedrock geology at the Medcalf lithium deposit consists of a basement of amphibolites and granite. Swarms of stacked lithium and tantalum pegmatites, that probably have a genetic relationship to the granite, intrude the amphibolites. Recent Quaternary aged cover obscures the Achaean basement rock and related regolith. The pegmatites have been classified as LCT (lithium-caesium-tantalum bearing) pegmatites.

The lithium and tantalum mineralisation is confined to pegmatite geology. A statistical analysis of the assay values indicated a natural cut-off of approximately 0.3% Li₂O and 65ppm Ta₂O₅. Therefore, Ashmore created mineralisation wireframes at a 0.3% Li₂O cut-off and a minimum down-hole intersection of 1m to 2m (**Error! Reference source not found.**). No edge dilution was incorporated into the lithium mineralisation wireframes, with some thin internal dilution incorporated to maintain continuity. A summary of the drilling data within the Project database is shown in Table 4.

Sampling and Sub-Sampling Techniques

Reverse circulation ("RC") drill samples representing one metre down-hole were collected with the corresponding interval logged and preserved in chip trays. Samples were split using a static cone splitter mounted beneath a cyclone return system to produce a representative sample. The drill-hole samples were submitted for laboratory analyses at Intertek in Maddington WA.

Drill core from diamond drilling was geologically logged and intervals selected for sampling and analyses. The diamond core has been cut in half along the long axis using an automatic diamond blade rock saw and half-core sampled for analysis. The samples lengths ranged from 0.5m to 1.0m within geological boundaries.

Classification Criteria

The Medcalf Mineral Resource was classified as Inferred Mineral Resource based on data quality, sample spacing, and lode continuity. The Inferred Mineral Resource was assigned to the deposit based on 80m by 40 to 80m drill spacing. The extrapolation of the lodes along strike and down-dip has been limited to distances of 40m.

Sample Analysis Method

Samples from the drilling were analysed by Intertek in Maddington WA using a standard preparation and FP6 analytical technique, which is considered fit for purpose when analysing samples primarily for ore-grade lithium.

Estimation Methodology

The block model was created and estimated in Surpac using Ordinary Kriging ("OK") grade interpolation. The mineralisation was constrained by pegmatite geology wireframes and internal lithium bearing mineralisation wireframes prepared using a nominal 0.3% Li₂O cut-off grade and a minimum down-hole length of 1m. The wireframes were used as hard boundaries for the interpolation. After review of the statistics, high grade cuts were not warranted. Variography and Kriging Neighbourhood Analysis ("KNA") were conducted in Supervisor software on 1m composited intervals.

A Surpac block model was created to encompass the extents of the known mineralisation. The block model was rotated on a bearing of 315°, with block dimensions of 20m NS by 10m EW by 5m vertical with sub-cells of 1.25m by 1.25m by 1.25m. The block size was selected based on results of KNA.

An orientated 'ellipsoid' search was used to select data and adjusted to account for the variations in lode orientations; however, all other parameters were taken from the variography derived from the main domain. Up to three passes were used for each domain. First pass had a range of 120m, with a minimum of 6 samples. For the second pass, the range was extended to 250m, with a minimum of 4 samples. For the third pass, the range was extended to 500m, with a minimum of 2 samples. A maximum of 12 samples was used for each pass with a maximum of 4 samples per hole.

Bulk densities ranging between 1.8t/m³ and 2.85t/m³ were assigned in the block model dependent on lithology, mineralisation and weathering. Fresh lithium mineralisation, which forms the bulk of the Mineral Resource was assigned 2.71t/m³ based on 282 core density measurements.

Cut-off Grades

The Statement of Mineral Resources has been constrained by the mineralisation solids, reported above a cut-off grade of 0.4% Li₂O and 65ppm Ta₂O₅. Additional studies are required to determine metallurgical and product characteristics, as well as optimal mining methods.

Mining and Metallurgical Methods and Parameters

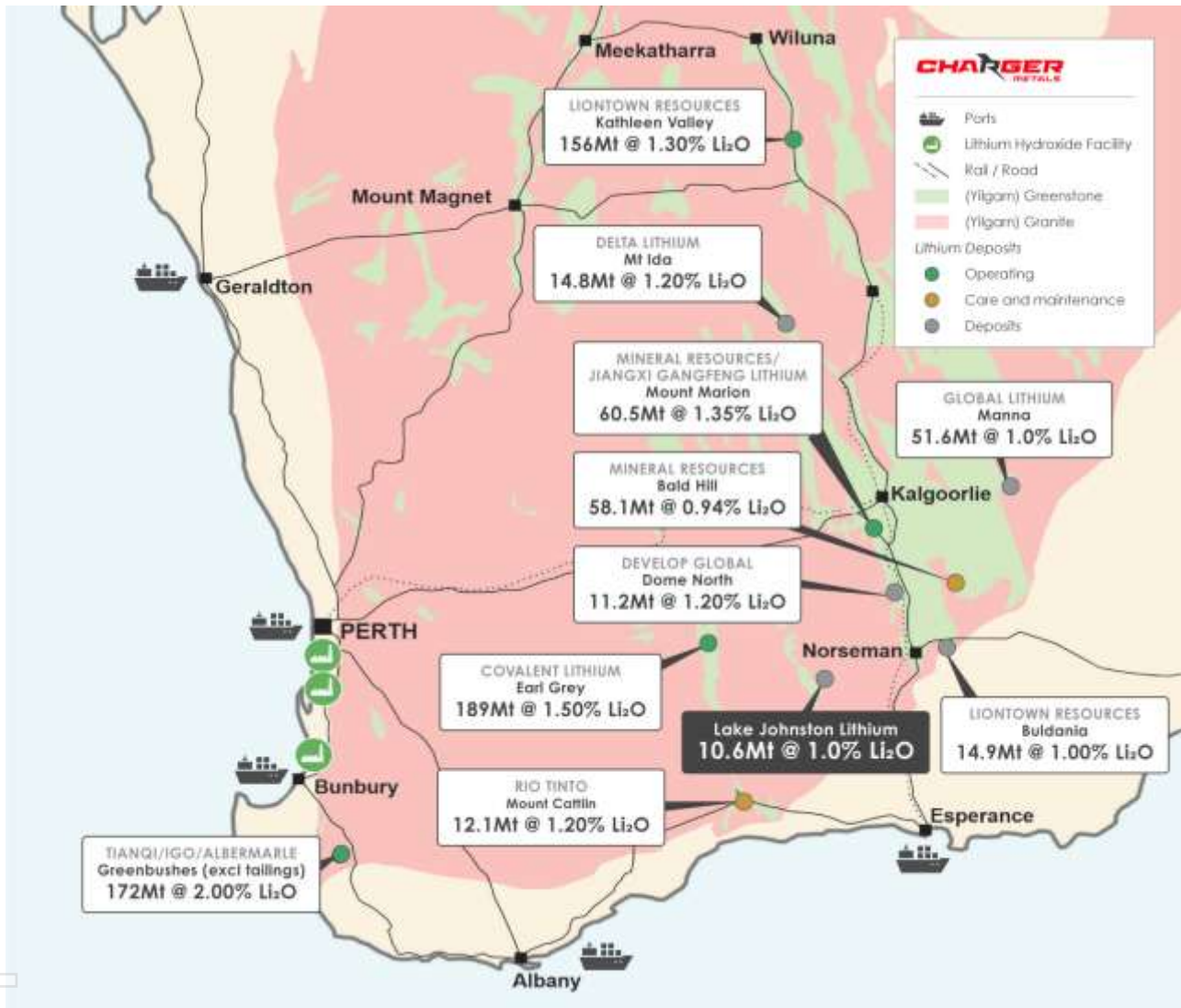


Figure 9. Location map of Lake Johnston Lithium Project in relation to other Yilgarn Block lithium projects. (Tonnages and grades shown for third party projects are estimates of current total Mineral Resources and/or Reserves based on publicly available information.)

The Medcalf Spodumene Project has 4 spodumene concentration plants within trucking distance and is only ~200km trucking distance to the Esperance Port (Figure 9).

Metallurgical studies on the diamond core samples collected during the quarter are progressing. The program will be undertaken in three major stages, utilising a stagewise approach to allow optimisation of the process stages. The program encompasses preparation, ore sorting amenability assessment, comminution characterisation, dense media separation (DMS) and heavy liquid separation (HLS) beneficiation test work, and variability work aimed at establishing metallurgical performance across ore domains.

Ore sorter concentrate generated in stage 1 will progress to stage 2 beneficiation. Stage 2 beneficiation will be conducted on smaller batch scale samples assessing the impact of crush size and density cuts on grade and recovery. Following completion of the Stage 2 batch scale testing, a bulk dense media cyclone test will be conducted to emulate commercial conditions utilised at spodumene concentration plants within trucking distance. The results from Stage 1 ore sorting testing will also be used to evaluate studies on the viability of direct shipment of an ore sorted product via the Esperance Port.

The proposed Medcalf mining methods are expected to be a combination of open pit followed by underground mining. The initial open pit mining optimisations, utilise conventional open pit and drill and blast methods, excavator, dump truck and ancillary equipment of appropriate size and

capacity. Each ore body is expected to be accessed via a decline developed from each open pit. The underground mining method is expected to be long hole open stopping of the larger lodes. Mining studies and metallurgical test work is ongoing. The Medcalf spodumene and tantalite bearing pegmatite can be used as feed to produce a lithium concentrate and a separate tantalum concentrate.

Charger Metals NL is a lithium focussed exploration Company actively exploring its Lake Johnston Lithium and Gold and Bynoe Lithium Project.

The Lake Johnston Lithium Project is located 450km east of Perth, in the Yilgarn Province of Western Australia. Lithium prospects occur within a 50km long corridor along the southern and western margin of the Lake Johnston granite batholith. Key target areas include the Medcalf and Medcalf West Spodumene Prospects, the Mt Gordon Lithium Prospect and much of the Mount Day LCT pegmatite field, prospective for lithium and tantalum minerals.

The Lake Johnston Lithium Project is located approximately 70km east of the large Earl Grey (Mt Holland) Lithium Project where Covalent Lithium Pty Ltd (manager of a joint venture between subsidiaries of Sociedad Química y Minera de Chile S.A. and Wesfarmers Limited) began mining and commissioning of the concentrator in March 2024. Mt Holland is understood to be one of the largest hard-rock lithium projects in Australia with Ore Reserves for the Earl Grey Deposit estimated at 189 Mt at 1.5% Li₂O.⁸
