Carnarvon Energy Limited (ASX:CVN)(Carnarvon or the Company) provides an update on the Company's activities and financial position as at 30 June 2026.

Company Snapshot

Bedout Sub-basin (Dorado, Pavo and Exploration)

- Transocean Equinox has been contracted for the 2027 Bedout drilling campaign, with drilling expected to commence in April 2027.
- One firm plus one contingent well in the campaign in Carnarvon's exploration permits.
- 92% increase in the Bedout Joint Venture prospective resources portfolio following completion of Bedout 3D Seismic MegaMerge project.

Corporate

- Maintained a strong balance sheet with A\$98 million in cash, no debt, and a US\$90 million development carry for the Dorado project.

Carnarvon's CEO, Philip Huizenga, commented:

"We've just signed the Transocean Equinox rig for a multi-well campaign in 2027 and updated our resource base on the back of the Bedout MegaMerge, a huge amount of work built up over more than a decade of 3D seismic acquisition across this basin.

Only six wells have been drilled in the basin on modern 3D data, yet this has already delivered four discoveries. That's an exceptional strike rate, and the low number of wells drilled highlights how underexplored this basin still is relative to its potential.

Ara is shaping up to be the standout well in the upcoming campaign. It's a genuine play-opening test of whether the oil success we've had at Dorado and Pavo extends into the northern part of our acreage, roughly 80 kilometres away. On its own it's an attractive prospect approaching 200 million barrels of oil equivalent (Gross, unrisks Pmean) with better than a 1-in-3 chance of success. What makes it so exciting is that a discovery in this area could de-risk a large part of our remaining portfolio — currently around 130 prospects and more than 3 billion barrels of prospective oil equivalent (Gross, unrisks Pmean)* across our four permits.*

*(Refer to ASX announcement on 23 June 2026) Prospective resources are the estimated quantities of petroleum that may potentially be recovered by the application of a future development project(s) and relate to undiscovered accumulations. These estimates have both a risk of discovery and a risk of development. Further exploration appraisal and evaluation is required to determine the existence of a significant quantity of potentially recoverable hydrocarbons.

We're doing all of this from a position of real financial strength, with A\$98 million in cash, no debt, and a US\$90 million development carry that gets triggered once we reach FID on Dorado. That means we can comfortably fund this exploration program while still retaining funds for future development activities.

Recent geopolitical events and the renewed focus on energy security, both for Australia and the broader region, has also increased the importance of developments such as Dorado. Dorado remains a high quality, liquids-rich project that can play an important role in security of oil supply."

Bedout Exploration

WA-435, 436, 437 & 438-P (Carnarvon 10-20%, Santos is the operator)

The Bedout Sub basin, located offshore Western Australia, remains one of the most prospective and technically advanced exploration regions in the country.

During the quarter, the Company contracted the Transocean Equinox semi-submersible mobile offshore drilling unit as part of a multi-well drilling campaign¹.

The Transocean Equinox was selected after a comprehensive bid evaluation process which commenced in early 2025. The rig is currently engaged in a multi-well exploration drilling campaign off the coast of Victoria, which is expected to be completed by early next year.

The Bedout exploration campaign is expected to commence from April 2027, with one firm well in Carnarvon's exploration permits, and one contingent well.

The prospects which have been shortlisted for this drilling campaign include Ara, Yuma, Goats Eye and Hutton, which are all defined on the Bedout MegaMerge 3D seismic survey. If the firm and contingent wells are both drilled, the total expected cost to Carnarvon will be approximately A\$20 million, which would be funded from Carnarvon's current cash balance.

The objective of the 2027 Bedout exploration campaign is to further define the scale of the Bedout Sub-basin's resource potential and will target some of the largest prospects in the exploration portfolio. Assessment of these prospects has been greatly enhanced by the completion of recent technical work which has significantly expanded the Company's prospective resource estimates across its permits.

During the quarter, the Company completed its interpretation of the Bedout Mega-Merge seismic reprocessing project, delivering a 92% increase in Carnarvon's prospect resource inventory. The Company now estimates gross prospective resources of 6,256 million barrels of oil equivalent (mmboe) (gross, unrisks Pmean)* across 130 prospects, a significant increase from the 3,263 mmboe (gross, unrisks Pmean)* reported in June 2025. The net prospective resource to the Company is now 1,021 mmboe (unrisks Pmean)*.

This step-change reflects significantly improved subsurface imaging from the seamless integration of multiple high-quality seismic surveys within the Mega-Merge dataset.

The four prospects which have been shortlisted as potential drilling targets account for approximately 14% of the total risks portfolio (unrisks Pmean) and contain prospective resources of approximately 851 mmboe (gross, unrisks Pmean)*. Drilling success at any of these targets could significantly derisks numerous analogous prospects, further enhancing the quality of the basin prospectivity.

The most likely firm well for the 2027 campaign would target Ara, which will be testing a new basin play fairway some 80km north of the Dorado field. Success at Ara would materially de-risk the follow-up Yuma prospect, which shares similar play elements, and would position Yuma to be considered as the contingent well in this campaign.

Alternative contingent wells under consideration are the Hutton and Goats Eye prospects, which target the as-yet untested Late Permian carbonate play system. Success on this play would open a completely new exploration fairway across WA-436-P, which contains a substantial portion of the Bedout Sub-basin's mapped prospective resources.

The Bedout Joint Venture has achieved a 67% exploration success rate to date, underpinned by high-quality 3D seismic data that has materially improved prospect definition and continues to demonstrate the basin's broader potential.

Project Development

Dorado WA-64-L (Carnarvon 10%, Santos 80%, operator)

The Dorado oil and gas field, situated about 150 kilometres offshore from Port Hedland in Western Australia at a water depth of around 90 metres, stands as one of the country's most significant undeveloped oil discoveries. Port Hedland itself plays a crucial role as a fuel import hub for Western Australia's iron ore mining industry, handling between 1.5 and 2 billion litres of diesel imports annually.

A preliminary development plan has been completed for the field, which considers a staged approach, beginning with liquids production (Phase 1) followed by a potential gas export phase (Phase 2).

The Phase 1 liquids development concept, refined in 2024, is based on a single wellhead platform supporting up to twelve wells tied back to a Floating Production Storage and Offloading (FPSO) facility. This configuration has been designed to deliver efficient liquids production while allowing for potential future tiebacks from nearby fields in the Bedout Sub-basin, such as Pavo.

Carnarvon estimates that the Dorado and surrounding fields contain gross 2C resources of 249 million barrels of light oil and condensate and 1.1 trillion cubic feet of gas.

With drilling activity in the region resuming in April 2027, the Operator has indicated that project development work will recommence in line with the evaluation of further Bedout basin resources.

Cash and liquidity position

The Company remains well funded and ended the quarter with approximately A\$98million in cash, no debt, and a 19.9% stake in Strike Energy.

Carnarvon also maintains US\$90 million in future Dorado development cost carry.

During the quarter, the administrative, corporate and staff costs of the Company were funded by the interest earned on the Company's cash holdings.

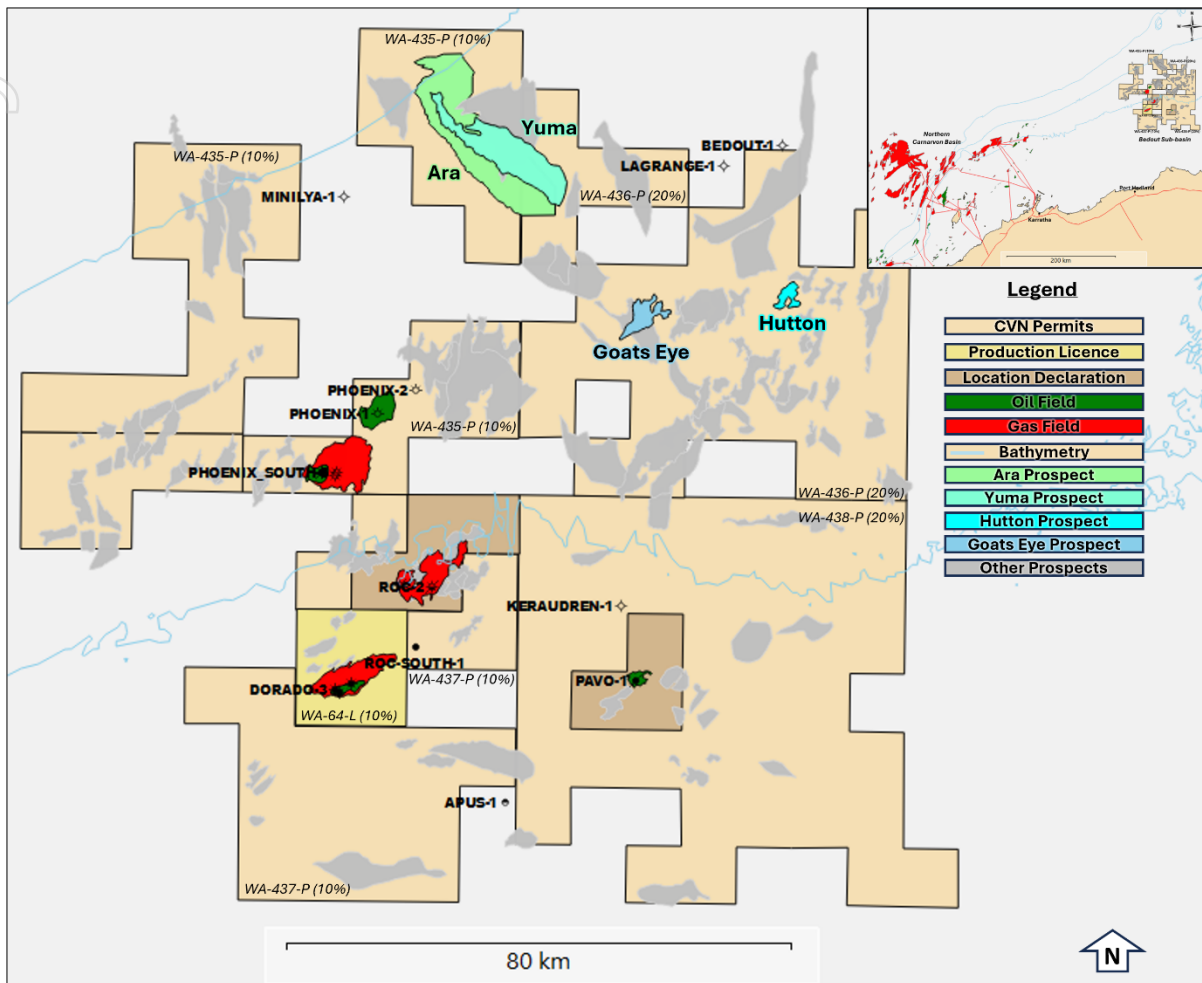


Figure 2: Project Map with Carnarvon having an interest in around 11,000 km² acreage

Resources

All prospective resources in this update are prepared as at 30 June 2025 and 23 June 2026 pursuant to the announcements released to the ASX on 28 August 2025 and 23 June 2026. The estimates of prospective resources included in this update have been prepared in accordance with the definitions and guidelines set forth in the SPE-PRMS. Carnarvon is not aware of any new information or data that materially affects the information included in this update, and that all material assumptions and technical parameters underpinning the estimates in this update continue to apply and have not materially changed.

Prospective resources have been reported using the best estimate. Prospects are made up of multiple potential reservoir horizons and these are “rolled-up” statistically into a single prospective resource. These prospective resources are statistically aggregated up to the field level and arithmetically summed to the project level.

Conversion from gas to barrels of oil equivalent is based on Gross Heating Value. Carnarvon uses a constant conversion factor of 5.7 Bscf/MMboe. Volumes of oil and condensate, defined as ‘C5 plus’ petroleum components, are converted from MMbbl to MMboe on a 1:1 ratio.
